"An FASD summer camp was offering to youth who were diagnosed with FASD, the chance to come and attend the camp for a week in the summer. The mentor who worked with youths in a First Nation Community, explained the camp to the children and caregivers and everyone was excited and wanted to attend. The mentor spent many hours planning and helping the families prepare for this exciting opportunity. Unfortunately, the families could not afford the cost of camp or for the necessities to bring to camp. The mentor who was very determined that the children would not miss this opportunity to attend and experience a different way of life, even if it was only for a week, set out to make the impossiblepossible. The mentor had a discussion with Willow Winds and was grateful for their support in covering the cost of the enrollment and sleeping bags. The mentor then reached out to other mentors and community partners and received everything else that the children would need to be able to attend the camp! Between the mentor and Willow Winds, the children also have supportive transportation to and from the camps. The mentor stated, "I am so happy the children are going to experience the world, outside of their community as they have never been able to before. Success Stories from the Heart In the past year participant has struggled with addictions. While a number of applications went in over the year for her to attend treatment she would not go when she was contacted. She recently told her mentor that she was ready to go and took the initiative to call the treatment center without support. She was told they had a bed in Detox for her the next morning at 8 AM and that after she finished Detox she would be moved into treatment. She reached out to a family member and told her she needed to be in Detox the next morning and asked for a ride and made arrangements with family to care for her children. She recently reached out to the Mentor and let her know she was done Detox and had been moved into treatment and wanted her mentor to know how much she appreciated her and the work she did with her. She told her that without her support she would not have found the courage to leave her children and go away for upwards of a month.
